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From the Director's Chair

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The Louisiana Legislature held a Third Extraordinary Session in November, specifically to address certain revenue and finance issues, including sales and income taxes. The original proposal in House Bill 10 was to repeal the sales tax exemption currently given to the parish Councils on Aging. The version of HB10 sent to the Governor for his signature on November 25, 2024 retains the exemption contained in La. R.S. 47:305.66, so it is expected that the COAs will continue to be exempt from sales tax.

GOEA is finishing up the process of adding the new positions we received this last budget year. We are already seeing some results from the ability to deliver more attention to the needs of the seniors of Louisiana, and we are very excited about the future.

The work continues to develop changes in our Policies & Procedures to comply with the new provisions of the Older Americans Act. GOEA staff will present more details at our 2025 Subgrantee Conference, set for April 1-3, 2025 at the Crowne Plaza Hotel here in Baton Rouge. We gathered many ideas from the 2023 training about what is most important to the field and are working to develop an agenda that will be interesting and helpful to all. We look forward to hosting all of you!

GOEA staff attended and presented at the Louisiana Aging Network Association ("LANA") conference in Lake Charles, and the Louisiana Association of Council on Aging Directors ("LACOADA") conference in Bossier City in October. We appreciate and enjoy the opportunity to network with the field and share ideas on how to best serve the senior citizens of Louisiana.

Winter Weather Preparedness

Winter Weather Safety Tips

- Never leave space heaters unattended.
 - Keep heaters 3-ft from flammable material.
 - Place on a flat, solid surface.
 - Plug heaters directly into the wall.
 - Check smoke alarm batteries.
- Charge all electronics.
- Stock up on water and non-perishable food.
- Watch out for slippery surfaces when walking and driving.

Remember the 4 P's

- **Pipes:** Wrap exposed faucets and pipes; keep water trickling.
- **Pets:** Bring pets inside and provide blankets for warmth.
- **People:** Check on elderly people and children.
- **Plants:** Bring plants in containers into the house; cover sensitive outdoor plants with sheets.

Cold Weather Life Safety

• **Frostbite:** signs and symptoms include numbness and tingling, a gray, blue, purple, brown, red, or ashy, appearance, hard or waxy skin, clumsiness due to joint and muscle stiffness, blisters upon rewarming.

- Rewarm skin, which may peel and hurt like a sunburn.
- Contact a healthcare provider for direction and, if frostbite is deep, go to an emergency room.

• **Hypothermia:** signs and symptoms include shivering or fumbling hands, exhaustion or drowsiness, confusion or memory loss, slurred speech, bright red, cold skin or very low energy in infants

- Protect victim against wind, drafts, and further heat loss with, dry clothes and blankets
- Move to warm, dry shelter
- In a warm setting, remove wet clothes, hats, gloves, shoes and socks.
- Begin rewarming the person with extra clothing and warm blanks.
- Have the person drink warm, non-caffeine, nonalcoholic drinks. Do not give fluids to an unconscious person.

• If the hypothermic person is unconscious call TUPD or 911. If the person has no pulse or signs of breathing, begin CPR and/or ventilations.



Heat your home safely.

Keep anything that can burn 3 feet away from a fireplace, wood stove or space heater.

New Orleans Council on Aging: On September 30th, the New Orleans Council on Aging (NOCOA) staff hosted a "Meet and Greet" for the staff of Elderly Protective Services (EPS), Region 1. The purpose of the meeting was for everyone to meet in person and learn more about the services provided by each group. Christina St. Cyr, EPS Supervisor, Region 1, gave an overview on the types of cases EPS investigates. Members of the NOCOA social services department gave an overview of the various programs including outreach, information and assistance and the National Family Caregiver Support Program. NOCOA Aging and Disability Resource Center and SenioRx staff also provided presentations on Medicare Open enrollment and various prescription assistance programs to assist individuals without insurance and those who fall into the Medicare doughnut hole. The groups are planning to meet again to brainstorm solutions on issues impacting older adults in the region. We had a great time meeting and learning about the services offered by EPS.
